Velvet's Miraculous Make-Over

Dedicated dog lovers give Velvet a second chance at life.

Shorewood first learned of Velvet in May of 2010 when she was in the care of a very small rescue with limited means in North Carolina. Her story is heartbreaking.

Velvet's owner took her to the groomer on regular basis due to her horrible body odor. The groomer threatened to report the owner to the authorities due to Velvet's lack of medical attention.

We do not know why, but her owner refused to take her to the vet. One day, the owner told the groomer to just 'keep her'.

The groomer found an animal rescue. When the rescue got Velvet, she had lost all of her hair and her body was covered with thick scabs. She could barely see due to a green discharge coming from her eyes. A black tarry substance was coming out of her ears. Due to her extreme weight she had difficulty breathing and could barely walk. Velvet weighed 63 pounds. What an existence!

A very kind woman from the rescue started Velvet's treatment. She bathed her daily and scrubbed her body in an attempt to remove the scabs. Velvet's problems were extreme. This woman knew that she needed to get Velvet to someone with more knowledge of Cocker Spaniels and started asking around. This was when Shorewood entered the picture. "Would you be able take this dog?"

We needed to get Velvet to Wisconsin but she would not survive a long road trip. We needed a solution. What should we do? Think. Make phone calls. Send emails. Our contact in North Carolina contacted Pilots and Paws, a volunteer organization of pilots who fly shelter dogs to safety. The weather was a problem and our pilot did not want to fly her in the summer heat. These aren't jumbo jets with air conditioning and food service. Patience.

Finally the call came. On September 8, just a few days before the Wigglebutt Walk, Velvet boarded a tiny two-seater airplane in North Carolina. Velvet was on her way to Shorewood Cocker Rescue.

Hours later, I arrived at the Waukegan Illinois airport. The plane landed. There was no time for chatting. The pilot told me that Velvet could not walk. He carried Velvet to my van and put her inside. She looked like a hog. The stench was overwhelming. I began to doubt myself. How could I turn this creature into an adoptable dog?

The next day, I was up early. Today was a new day for Velvet. Top of the list? A simple thing, blood work at the vet, but how could I lift this girl into the van. Suddenly, I remembered some old under-utilized portable stairs getting dusty in the barn. After getting Velvet in the van, a light bulb went off in my head and I tossed the stairs into the back of the van. I would need them later to get Velvet back in the van and back home with me.

Our new schedule started when we got home. It was bath time and getting Velvet into the tub was a challenge. Eventually, I had her lathered with medicated shampoo when with a burst of energy, she suddenly jumped out of the tub. How was I going to get a slippery 63 pound cocker back in the tub? After a wet, wild, and well mannered play time, she resumed her day of beauty in my tiny bath tub spa. So much water in such a small space! That was the last bath Velvet had at home. From that day forward we went to the groomer twice a week for a bath. At home, I treated her ears with an old cocker staple, blue power and I treated her eyes with cyclosporine. This process went on for months, but Velvet's condition was improving.

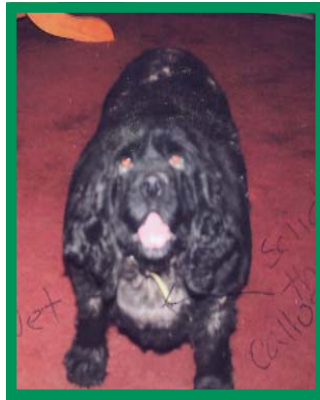
Our girl began to lose weight after being prescribed medication to treat her hyperthyroidism. The scabs started to fall off. Soon, she could climb the three steps into the house without help and trot around the yard. Her ears cleared up and we were able to reduce of the cyclosporine.

She was 31 pounds lighter and had been transformed into a beautiful girl with a lovely black coat. This southern belle was finally ready for adoption. Velvet found her forever home in June of 2011.

Normally when I write this I message I take the opportunity to reminisce over the happenings of the past year. My 2011 nearly ended in July when I had a farm related accident. I spent most of the fall either in the hospital or in physical therapy. As I grew older, I sometimes wondered about the future of Shorewood Cocker Rescue. I now know I no longer need to worry. Our volunteers stepped up and they didn't miss a beat. They continued to take in dogs, many from deplorable situations, and place them in wonderful homes. With the new Wisconsin dog law, they were buried in paper work. This sometimes required them to drive many additional miles to get the proper forms. A national shortage of the heartworm treatment drug required them to tap all their resources to save the lives of several Heartworm positive dogs. Foster homes stepped up and in many cases took an extra dog. In addition new foster homes were recruited. The Wigglebutt Walk was the most successful ever. I will end by saying, thank you to all our adoptive families for your support and a very special thanks to the Shorewood Volunteers for making MY 2011 a success. *Elaine Bauman*

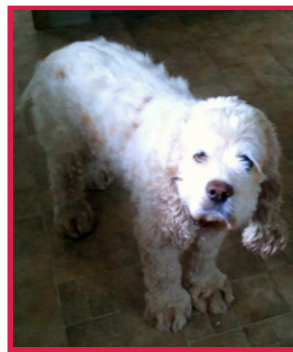

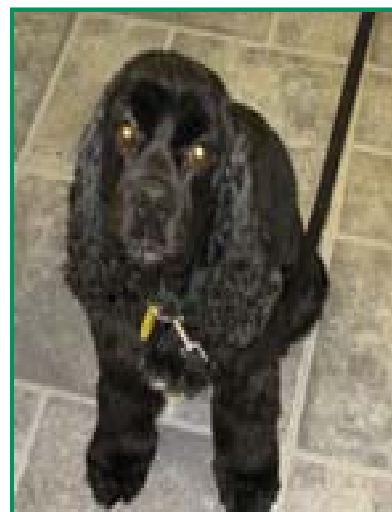
